Priest in Charge

Dearly Beloved in Christ,

It's summertime, and in the Church this is also known as "The Long Green Season." Green, because that is the liturgical color in the sanctuary from Trinity Sunday in the Spring until Christ the King Sunday, the last Sunday before Advent. Our readings in the Sunday Lectionary (The Revised Common Lectionary) have focused on those tasked by God to carry forth the promise to become "*a blessing to all the peoples of the Earth,*" beginning with Sarah and Abraham, Rebecca and Isaac, Rachel Leah and Jacob. We have learned so far that those chosen to carry forth this promise are real people like any of us, with strengths and shortcomings, and whose lives are often in precarious circumstances. And yet, they somehow manage to carry the promise forward nevertheless!

Summertime is also a time for "summer reading," whether at home or on vacation. My current summer reading includes **Mott Street** by Ava Chin: the story and history of the Chinese Exclusion Act throughout American history, told through the experiences of the author's family tree. Chin was inspired to research her family history when she saw an historical photograph of the completion of the Transcontinental Railroad. Despite knowing that at least one of her ancestors, and thousands of other Chinese immigrants, did a great share of work on the railroad on the west-to-east portion. And yet, the photograph did not feature one Chinese face at the celebration of the railroad's completion. Why is that, she wondered? It is a fascinating examination of American history from a different perspective than most history books!

Here are two more books I can recommend that have to do with what religion can tell us about the meaning of life. The first is **The Spiritual Life**, by Evelyn Underhill, an Anglican lay woman who also writes extensively on Christian Mysticism. **The Spiritual Life** is a transcript of a series of talks she gave on the radio in Advent, 1936. It's a tiny book with a large view of the "*great truths concerning man's spiritual life in simple language.*" It is a book I read and re-read almost every year. She writes, that "*Being, not wanting, having and doing, is the essence of the spiritual life...with his widening of the horizon, our personal ups and downs, desires, cravings, efforts, are seen in scale; as small and transitory spiritual facts, with a vast, abiding spiritual world and lit by a steady spiritual light.*" We learn, as the Blessed Saint Augustine once said, God is the only reality, and we are real only so far as we are in His order, and He in us!

Another favorite little book is **The Primacy of Love**, by the Franciscan Sister who teaches theology at Villanova University, Ilia Delio. "*What do we live for,*" she asks. "*This is the question many of us ask at the end of a very long day, especially in the conflicted moments of life. My answer is simple: we live to love. If we doubt love, we doubt our own existence.*" With unusual ease, Delio is able to weave the stories of anthropology, quantum physics and classical theology to help the reader to see that "love" is within the entire working order of the universe as a whole! Like the characteristics of human love, attraction, irresistibility, and union, even elements as fundamental as atoms, those building blocks of all known matter, exhibit a kind of love, endowed, suggests Delio, by their Creator! "*What more do we need than the power of love to turn the tears of this world into a heartfelt song that endures beyond time and space?*" Indeed!

We are those people who live to be Evangelists!

This, no doubt, comes as a surprise to many of us. The very word “evangelism” carries numerous connotations in American life – and most often conjures an image of something like and Elmer Gantry tent revival, or the ubiquitous televangelists that are scattered across the “air waves” and cable networks. Yet the very word is comprised of two Greek words: eu or ev, which means good, and angel, which means message or messenger. Good Angel, or better still, Good Messenger, is one possible translation of evangelion in the New Testament. We often use this word to describe the message of Jesus as Good News!

This begins to point us in the right direction as to why Jesus calls us, one and all, to be his disciples: disciples who are to proclaim, tell, and live the Good News of Jesus Christ the Son of God. He rarely asks them to believe anything, but always calls us to “follow him.” This following includes telling others the things he tells people about God his Father, and how to live here and now in his Father’s Kingdom, the kingdom of God, or the kingdom of heaven on earth.

If we are to be Good Angels, or Good Messengers, then we are meant to share our good news with others. This is as simple as sharing with someone why it is you come to Christ Church Rock Spring Parish. You may love the worship. You may love sitting in our historic 1805 church. You may like hanging around in the Parish Hall after church to have coffee or tea, a few things to eat, and a conversation with someone you have not seen for some time. You may love the spaghetti dinners. Or, the Rummage Sale! Or, our new environmental team, The Rock Spring Keepers! Or, you love hearing our broad mix of traditional hymns, praise songs and folk music! Or, you give me a responsible place to recycle film plastic!

The number one reason a new persons might come to church is the result of an invitation or relationship with someone on the church. A relationship with one of our many home-grown evangelists! This is cited by numerous polls over decades of polling – someone invited me to come, and I stayed!

A working definition of an evangelist is: One hungry person telling another hungry person where there is a great meal served every week! Again, poll after poll suggests that after moving and then looking for a house of worship, an invitation from someone, or a personal relationship with someone, is the number one reason people, even non-believers, will come to a church. Thus, the importance of telling others about our church, and what goes on in this place all week long!

The second most important reason a person comes back to a church is the feeling of being Welcomed. Christ Church is quite good at this. It is near impossible for someone to sneak in, sit through a service, and sneak out without at least one person introducing themselves and welcoming the newcomer! Once a person is in our presence, we suddenly become first-class evangelists, telling them why you love being here and all the things we do as a community of Christ’s Love for a broken world! It helps to take time to think about ourselves as evangelists in the best sense of that word. As one who loves the spirit of Christ in this place, and tells others about it. Tell them and they will come! Evangelism can be fun when we share our love of God and our love for one another!

Christ Church Vestry Minutes

June 21, 2023

[Virtual Meeting Via Zoom]

Attendance: Fr. Kirk, Jane O’Leary, Leslie Amtmann, Tony Davis, Lyn Edmunds, Janet Clifton, Peggy Reel, Lois Tidey

Meeting began at 7:05 with opening prayer by Fr. Kirk.

Vestry minutes from meeting of 5/17/2023, were approved as written.

Treasurer’s Report: Cash balance reflects loss in value of Edward Jones account; won’t know value of T.Rowe Price account until end of June. Member contributions are at 93% of budget. Cash flow struggles to cover bills. We are doing okay but will need to withdraw more money from TRP. To withdraw more than \$3000 requires vestry approval (due to deficit budget). One option is to withdraw \$1500 now, and see if more or less is needed. Treasurer recommends reviewing all accounts before renewing service (vs. auto-renewal).

CCS balance is now \$7550, after a \$100 gift. Two of five recent gifts are from non-members in response to Fr. Kirk’s letter.

Noted recent bequest of \$2500 from estate of Eleanor Osbourne deposited into general fund (see below under Rector’s Report for discussion).

Six month “Giving Statements” to be issued end of June. In addition to pledges, it was recommended to include other giving as well.

Expenses: Salaries are above budget. Utilities are down compared to last year: 118% of budget, which is good. Telephone is over budget, likely related to expense of one time equipment charge incurred when Parish Admin renegotiated equipment charge, which will be \$188 compared to previous \$215. Music expenses reflect salary, yearly music licensing fee (\$223), Choirmaster’s Handbook, and bagpiper (\$175).

Bill for HVAC Maintenance (changing filters) by First Class Mech (\$580). We can change some filters ourselves, but complexity of system warrants professional service.

Audit: Peggy reports audit being wrapped up after inconsistencies resolved and missing 941 forms and statements located. ECW and Cemetery funds are well documented, other areas will need work. Based on audit, will be able to advise proposed finance committee in the future, Treasurer’s Report accepted.

Cemetery: Leslie answered questions and explained the reasoning behind the proposed Cemetery Policy and Procedures for our historic Cemetery. Vestry approved the comprehensive and clear document. It was suggested that signage re: Historic nature of CC Cemetery might be useful at entry points to the Cemetery (e.g., “closed dusk to dawn;” “please do not touch memorials,” etc.), but no decision made at this meeting.

Rector's Report: Announcing a National Festival for the Episcopal Church, "It's All About Love: A Festival for the Jesus Movement," to be held July 9-12, 2023, at the Baltimore Convention Center. Features programs by presiding Bishop, Diocesan Bishop and Bishop Co-adjutor. Full Cost \$250, Half price for people in diocese, and no admission charge for all-day volunteers. (episcopalmaryland.org)

Unrestricted gift from estate of Eleanor Osborne. Fr. Kirk recommends CC have a clear policy for recognition and intentional use of such gifts as "something different" from ordinary income (Episcopal Church Center in NYC has a model policy). Policy serves two purposes:

1. To inform congregation of a gift and ultimately, its intentional use for a special church project or mission, and 2. That funds will not be listed in parochial report as "ordinary income," but rather as designated to fund a future project or mission, and/or endowment.

Action item: Leslie is recreating the missing book used to record gifts, by reading past Vestry minutes and preparing a spreadsheet to be entered in a bound book.

Re Osborne Gift: Motion was passed to deposit \$2500 gift into TRowe Price account, until such time that the gifted funds be intentionally designated to fund specific projects, if and when such projects are approved.

Rector will be away week of August 19th'

Junior Warden: Tony is actively monitoring temps in the Parish Hall, where heat is reset to normal conditions to accommodate groups. Requesting that pass-through doors remain closed to keep kitchen appliance heat out of hall in summer months. Tony away last week of June.

ECW: Hugely successful rummage sale! Proceeds \$2600! Bookmarks and pencils given to all customers. Food truck sold out by noon! Group working to clear Hall especially of books.

Rock Spring Keepers: Looking to hold fall event, possibly a museum trip or watershed walk. NexTrex Challenge #2 began 6/1, with Richard reporting 22# collected in first two weeks. Adopt-A-Road running smoothly, with uptick in trash in warmer weather. Planning a fall project, a native plant bed near church sign at entry to parking lot.

Meeting adjourned at 8:20 pm, with closing prayer. Next meeting is July 19, 2023, at 7 pm.

KEEPER'S CORNER

Rock Spring Church Road is looking good, thanks to our regular Adopt-A-Road trash pick-up. Thanks to all who have stepped up during the dog days to keep cans, bottles, cigarette butts, and plastic gloves out of the small stream which empties into the Bay. Our efforts are appreciated by local residents who wave as they see us regularly on the road in our yellow vests.

Progress Report on the second TREX Challenge: In less than two months, CC has collected nearly 400 pounds of stretch plastic which will soon be recycled. Kudos to Richard Tidey who has reached out to local merchants for plastic donations with positive results. Richard makes sure the plastic is clean and properly weighed, no small task. We are well on our way to earning a second Trex bench by year's end. Please continue to bring in acceptable plastic wraps to put us over the top.

Not so fun fact: My family recently traveled to Kent County where we had many close encounters with the immature form (nymph) of the invasive Spotted Lanternfly. These cute little bugs with red spots grow to become colorful mature pests known to destroy trees and crops, especially in orchards. Lanternflies damage outdoor property and can be a nuisance to people. There are few natural predators, so the life cycle easily continues from year to year. Sprayed vinegar will kill lanternflies instantly.

"The Department of Agriculture strongly encourages people to stomp, squash or swat lanternflies when they see them." US Dept of Agriculture 2023

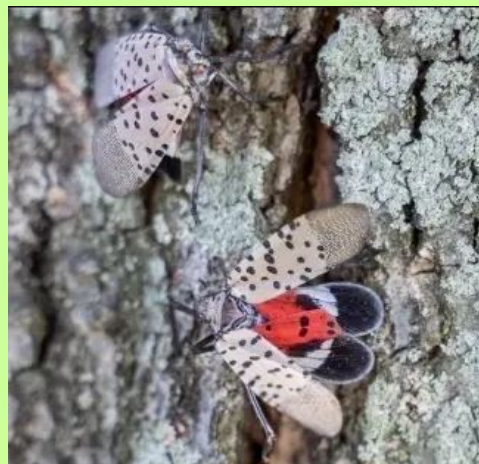

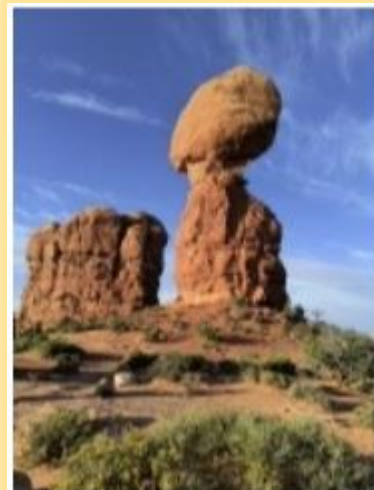

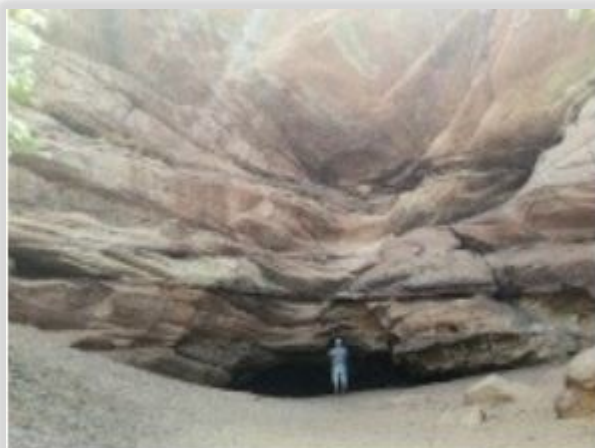
