## PRIEST IN CHARGE: JUNE 2025

Dearly Beloved Community of Love,

May has been a rich opportunity to spend time with our new bishop, The Right Reverend Carrie Schoefield-Broadbent. First, at Clergy Conference at the Diocesan Camp and Conference Center in Adamstown, MD on the Buckeystown Pike, then two meetings in Harford County at Ascension Episcopal Church with clergy and lay leaders, and the next morning at St. Mary's with just the clergy, including some from Anne Arundel County. In all three meetings the focus was on becoming A Community of Love.

Understanding the Church as A Community of Love is the best way to describe the work Jesus was doing in gathering people to return our understanding that the heart of God's will and all the commandments one can find in The Bible centers on our love of God, love of our neighbors, and perhaps most important, love of oneself. After all, how can one honestly love God and neighbor "as yourself" if we do not already love our selves.

Love of one's self is based in accepting that we live under the Rule of God's mercy, compassion, forgiveness, and care for all persons, and for all of creation. This can be hard to accept when we so often are disappointed in ourselves, individually and socially as a community, a church, or even as a country. If it is not our remembrance of childhood traumas, it can just as often be the presence of ongoing violence all around us that can make us doubt whether anyone, let alone God, really loves us.

Thus, the importance of becoming A Community of Love. Bishop Carrie has travelled all across our diocese speaking to lay people and clergy while assembling a tripartite description of just what A Community of Love looks like: its Values, its Assumptions, and of course its Behaviors. There is a summary of these characteristics of A Community of Love posted outside the office in the parish Annex, and copies of the current iteration of these characteristics may be picked up in the back of the church to take home, to study, and to reflect on just what A Community of Love might look like. And more importantly, how such A Community of Love behaves and acts in the world about us. For there can be no mistake: Jesus knows that the Bible, and God his Father, are not concerned about how to get into heaven, but rather through its library of books of poetry, letters, historical accounts, prophecy, and stories offers those who read it a vision of how we might be active in bringing heaven to earth, here and now.

A word about "heaven" as the Bible, and especially Jesus, talks about it. It is simply expressing the very heart of God, for the heart of God is where we and all creation comes from, and all will one day return. As Jesus speaks of "the kingdom of heaven," it is another way of saying, "the kingdom of God," or perhaps more like "the reign of God's love, compassion, mercy and justice on Earth. In this sense, heaven is not about what happens when we die. It is what we are to be focused on here and now.

As I write this, it is the Feast of the Ascension, that event forty days after Easter about which Luke reports Jesus departing after appearing to the whole community of disciples since the Day of Resurrection. The deeper meaning of the Ascension, however, is about us, the Church, Jesus's Community of Love, and how we are to carry on his work of reconciliation in the world. Or, as he would understand it in Hebrew, tikkun olam, repair of the world. There is much work to do which Jesus began. What a true honor it is that he has gathered us and commissioned us to do the work that he does, "and greater things than these now that I am going to the Father."

# The Vision: A Community of Love

**The Core Values** of A Community of Love are: Faithfulness, Integrity, Compassion, Hospitality, Curiosity, Informed Choice, Transparency, Accountability, and Humility. In fact, perhaps Humility ought to be at the top of the list since its opposite, Hubris, has often been, throughout history, the stumbling block that has held the Church back from being A Community of Love.

**Some Core Assumptions** are: People are doing the very best they can with what they have, and capacities vary with time. It's a beautiful thing to ask for help when needed. Each of us sees things others don't. People may disagree with me and have pure motives. Differences are opportunities for learning and growing. Conflict itself is not good or bad, it's the way we move through conflict that can divide or unite. I may be contributing to the problem. Feedback is a gift. How we work through things is often more important than what we decide. Kind is better than nice.

**Some Core Behaviors** are: Make "I" statements. Ask genuine questions, give real apologies. Share relevant information. Use specific examples and agree on what important words mean. Explain reasoning and intent. Focus on interests, not positions. Test assumptions and inferences. Jointly design next steps. Practice the "circle back." Discuss undiscussable issues. Check our blind spots.

It's important to remind ourselves: Jesus didn't leave. He ascended to a new position of authority over The Community of Love he gathered, and which has continued as Christ's One, Holy, and Apostolic Church. It is also important to remember: As we continue building our community of love, these values, assumptions, and behaviors may change with time and context. That is, this vision is not written in stone, but is to be viewed as a living expression of the kind of community God in Christ calls us to be.

As you study and reflect on this Vision for the Diocese of Maryland, and for each parish community therein, give thanks that God has sent us a Bishop who cares deeply about the health and welfare of all of our churches. For the Community of Love must be most visible in its local congregations for the repair and reconciliation of the world Jesus began to become a reality!

# CHRIST CHURCH VESTRY MINUTES

April 16, 2025, 7 PM Virtual Meeting Via Zoom



**Attendance:** Fr. Kirk, Molly Neal, Jane O’Leary, Tony Davis, Leslie Amtmann, Lyn Edmunds, Rick Baker, Janet Clifton, Kate Davis, Peggy Reel, Lois Tidey

**Meeting began at 7:05 PM**, with a prayer from J. P. Newell. March minutes were accepted with one addition (Peggy R. will share audit responsibility with Kate).

Treasurer asked that we disregard “Draft” on the report, which is the final version. Jane notes that most funds are down or at “no cash” at end of March, which we will need to watch closely.

Pledges are at 95% of budget, much improved, though overall operating expenses are at 111% of budget, resulting in a deficit performance in the amount of \$8400. It will be difficult, but we will need to consider alternatives and budget revision, with oversight by Finance Committee (who meet right before each Vestry meeting.).The audit is in progress.

Report included two Account History spreadsheets, **CC Operations Fund** and **CC Cemetery Fund**, summarizing account activity and balances for each account through first quarter, 2025.

**Finance Committee** proposed a revision to the CC Gift Acceptance Policy to use the more inclusive term “gifts” rather than “bequests.” Also, a threshold of \$2000 was proposed to indicate when gifts are to be applied as income (below \$2000) or are to be deposited in the Operations Endowment Fund. Motion to accept changes in Gift Acceptance Policy was passed. Treasurer’s report accepted.

**Cemetery:** Christine Lane has agreed to be the third member of the Cemetery Committee, along with Chair Leslie Amtmann and Rick Baker. Committee will meet quarterly after Service, and as needed on an ad hoc basis.

**Rector:** Fr. Kirk participated in the annual renewal of ordination vows service at the Cathedral, among 100+ clergy. Bishop Carrie’s sermon is available on E News. Each parish received a “goody bag” with postcards to be affixed with our mailing labels and sent out to every house in the parish, noting also the Bishop’s Appeal. Fr. Kirk is working with Renee on services for Easter and Earth Day (4/27). Fr. Kirk will be away:

**Senior Warden:** April 5<sup>th</sup> was a great **Property Clean-up Day**, with 12 people doing a lot of work, inside and out. Sticks were removed, gardens cleared, mowers came later, 9 of 12 parish hall windows cleaned. Seal is compromised on three windows, likely will need repair. Shout out of thanks to all!

ECW tea will be held on Sunday, May 4, 2025. June 14<sup>th</sup> is the rummage sale; look for a schedule for receiving donations. Continuing spring cleaning around parish, shredding unneeded documents. The Memorial Day Service will be held Monday, May 26<sup>th</sup> at 9 am.

A wedding (of non-members) is scheduled in the church on May 10<sup>th</sup>. In the past, CC has not charged for community use of just the church building, though we have received donations in the range of \$50 - \$200. Based on an internet search, Senior Warden is recommending a policy in which a base of \$300 would be charged for a three-hour use of the church with access to the annex (for preparation and rest rooms). Vestry is in consensus with this policy.

**Junior Warden:** Anticipating the arrival of the new Parish Hall doors which are in production. Tony will remove the awning over the door on Saturday, and replace the siding May 4<sup>th</sup>.

Ants have returned. Lynn Pest control will be out to assess and treat on June 23.

Brief discussion about paint color for new PH doors, contenders are red or brown. Consensus is to go with ECW recommendation of brown to match other PH doors. New rain barrels will be “terra cotta” color.

**Rock Spring Keepers:** Property looking great! Hoping to maintain the results of clean up day, and do some weeding in the pollinator garden. Earth Day (4/27) will feature an eco-themed service, festive coffee hour with seed-starting project, learning about rain barrels, and raffle winners. Melinda Chase’s WSA project has begun with removal of invasives north of the annex and prep for rain barrels. There will be a Rogation Sunday blessing at the pollinator garden on May 25, with give-away of 100s of donated tulip bulbs. Molly and Melinda walked the entire perimeter of the church property, observing mature native trees and a healthy stream fed by the Rock Spring. The Keepers met Mrs. Etheline McKinney, a long time resident of property which abuts the church. Raffle Basket and Mower raffle ticket sales are modest, but significant, reports Molly.

**Next Vestry meeting will be held on Wednesday, May 29<sup>th</sup>, 2025, at 7 PM via Zoom.**

The meeting ended at 7:50 PM with a prayer for peace.

This month, it's all about pollinators!

That's right! June 16-22, 2025, marks the annual national celebration of Pollinator Week. Initiated by the Pollinator Partnership, this year's festivities across the nation will honor the "Wings of Life." Here in Maryland, The White House Nursery in Upperco will host a "Buzzing Celebration" in support of pollinator awareness and health.

Christ Church got a jump on the action Sunday, May 25<sup>th</sup>! We began with a service to observe Rogation Days (from the Latin rogare, meaning "to ask"), a time in the church calendar to seek blessings for our land, its inhabitants, and the common good.

Following the service, Fr. Kirk and the congregation met at the Pollinator Garden for this blessing. Several plants, such as Foxglove, are blooming, and a pollinator favorite, common milkweed, has multiplied. Keepers have observed pollinators on warmer days, but no pollinators greeted us on this chilly morning. Keep visiting, they will come!

Back at the Parish Hall, we admired the new stepping stones and planting near the busy rain barrels (more below). During a cozy coffee hour, plants and garden gloves were given away. Alas, the multitude of donated tulip bulbs were found to have literally bitten the dust during their long storage time. The desiccated bulbs were recycled in the church compost pile.

### Earth Day and Conservation Planting Update

Earth Day 2025 (April 27<sup>th</sup>) celebrated the installation of three new rain barrels to harvest roof run-off rainwater eroding the steep bank behind the Annex. The rain barrels came just in time for two weeks of heavy rains. Melinda Chase reports that the barrels are doing their job just fine, collecting rain run-off from the roof, and dispersing water gradually and evenly over the ground. Melinda has added attractive and functional stepping stones, mulch, and a small shrub to the area. The team is open to suggestions for native plants to replace the invasive ones which have been removed. The courtyard is looking especially beautiful this time of year, thanks to the efforts of many.

At the May meeting, the Finance Committee reviewed the Treasurer's Report, which showed income at 88% of budget and expenses at 104% of budget as of April 30, 2025. Member contributions are at 96% of budget.

In April, \$3,352 (100% of the prudent withdrawal amount for 2025) was withdrawn from the Operations Endowment Fund and deposited into the Operations checking account to apply to expenses. The budgeted prudent withdrawal amount from the Cemetery Endowment Fund will be withdrawn when needed for cash flow.

On June 8, Canon Kristofer Lindh-Payne will meet with the Finance Committee to share his experience and wisdom about how some congregations have used their property assets as a source of income and a resource for community engagement/mission.

The Audit Team of Kate Davis, Peggy Reel, and Rick Baker will begin their review of 2024 financial records imminently and will complete the process in time for September 1 submission to the Diocese.

Bonnie Klein has been working under Jane O'Leary's supervision to acquire the knowledge and learn the tasks required for the position of Treasurer. The Vestry voted unanimously on May 21 to approve the appointment of Bonnie to be Assistant Treasurer as her role expands. Eventually, Bonnie may be prepared to replace Jane as Treasurer, who has served as Interim Treasurer for 3.5 years.
