Dearly Beloved in Christ,

This year, January 6, the Feast of Epiphany, and Tuesday, February 17 mark the Season of Epiphany. Making February 18 Ash Wednesday, and the beginning of Lent. Epiphany means manifestation, or appearance – and is a season of the Church Year that focuses us on some of the ways in which Jesus Christ the Son of God became manifest, or known, not only to his neighbors and fellow countrymen and women in Israel, but to the Gentile world as well.

The primary events of the Epiphany Season are: The Visit of the Magi, or Wise Men; the Baptism of Jesus by John; turning water into wine at a Wedding Feast in Cana of Galilee (northern Israel); ending with The Transfiguration on a mountain top with three of the disciples on the Last Sunday of Epiphany. The Visit of the Magi and the Transfiguration feature bright light, while the Baptism of Jesus and the Transfiguration both feature the voice of God.

Both the Star that led the Magi to Bethlehem, and Jesus suddenly appearing dazzling white on the mountain top of the Transfiguration have led to the Season of Epiphany being called The Season of Light. This is echoed in the opening verses of the Gospel of John the evangelist (not the Baptizer, nor the visionary writer of the Book of Revelation), where we learn that the Word which was with God in the beginning, the Word that was God, is also the Light and Life of the World – a world which is otherwise often shrouded in deep darkness. Epiphany, then, means to remind us that the Light of Christ shines through the darkness somewhat like the way the light of a coastal lighthouse pierces the dark of night, and through the darkness and rough waters of an ocean storm. The Light of Christ is what guides us to safety, leads us beside still waters, for the sake of the Word's name, Yeshua, or Joshua, which means Yahweh saves, or God is Salvation.

At Jesus's baptism by John in the River Jordan, and his transfiguration on the mountaintop while talking with Moses and Elijah, those with Jesus heard a voice as he came up out of the water. Or, in one version of his baptism it suggests that only Jesus may have heard the voice. At his baptism it says, "This is my Son, my Beloved; with whom I am well pleased." While at the Transfiguration it is speaking to the three disciples: "This is my Son, the Beloved; listen to him." In the Gospel of John some of the bystanders thought it sounded like thunder! In the first instance, the voice let's Jesus know who he really is, and let's anyone else who may have heard it know who he is as well. By the time of the Transfiguration, just before he sets off to Jerusalem and the showdown with Pilate and the Empire, the voice confirms his identity to the disciples, and commands that they listen to him. Let the reader know, "the disciples" always means us – we who are those who follow him.

This is why one feature of Epiphany Season is that it is a time to Renew our Baptismal Covenant, which reminds us not just who we are, but also whose we are – by virtue of our baptism we belong to Christ, a title that means God's Anointed. And because one of the promises we make in our Baptismal Covenant is that all that we do and all that we say will proclaim the Good News of Jesus Christ, it is important that we listen to Him every day and every night. Which is why the Book of Common Prayer was first conceived – to give us the means of both morning and evening prayers, accompanied by readings from scripture so that we might hear Christ's calling to us as we begin and end each day. These forms of prayer, and the Daily Lectionary found at the back of the Book of Common Prayer together offer us a daily ritual in which we listen to Him – and promise to seek and serve Christ in all persons; loving our neighbor; and strive to work for justice and peace for all people, respecting the dignity of every human being. In this way Jesus is made manifest to us, and to all to whom we are sent in his name. Epiphany is our season to become the manifestation of Christ to all people!

CHRIST CHURCH VESTRY MINUTES

NOVEMBER 19, 2025 , 7 PM Virtual Meeting Via Zoom



Attending: Fr. Kirk, Molly Neal, Jane O’Leary, Leslie Amtmann, Rick Baker, Kate Davis, Lyn Edmunds, Lois Tidey.

Meeting opened at 7 pm with prayer “to clear out our hearts, O God.” Minutes from the October 15, 2025, meeting were accepted as written.

Treasurer: Funds from investment accounts continue to grow. Member contributions, as of 10/31/25, are at 100% of budget, and income is at 93% of budget, thanks to the faithful efforts of our congregation. Thanks to those who helped with recent cash raffle which provided to its full potential. Expenses are at 93% of budget. Though income and expenses are “evening out,” both are slightly below budgeted amounts.

Finance committee is working to develop 2026 budget by researching and estimating expense to income ratio. Committee will bring proposed budget to December Vestry meeting for consideration and approval. Molly expressed good feelings about these things are budget-wise: “we have a good path to follow.” She notes positive development of parish being involved in developing budget, with people who are aware and committed to understand our finances. Treasurer’s report accepted.

Cemetery: Leslie reports a memorial plaque was placed on the graves of Frances Lynch and Thomas Lynch Ward. Additionally, two plots were sold in the cremains section.

Rector: Fr Kirk and Molly are heading for Diocesan Convention Nov. 22 and 23. Congratulations to Mallory and Kirk Kubicek who celebrated their 50th wedding anniversary (Nov. 1st) with a family gala. Fr. Kirk will soon complete his annual health exam.

Holiday season begins with the First Sunday of Advent on Nov. 23rd. The church will be decorated Saturday, Dec. 20; candlelight Christmas Eve service is Dec. 24th at 5 pm

Senior Warden: Molly reports incident in which a hunter (unknown to CC) with crossbow entered the woods, prompting “No Hunting without permission” signs to be put up. Mr. Cooper is presently the only hunter with permission to hunt on CC property.

ECW has holiday raffle in the parish hall. The Giving Tree with gift tags for Harford Family House will be in the church entry on Sunday Nov. 24th. ECW will participate in Hope for the Homeless on 1/12/26, providing meals to families in hotels, and lunch at Centre Methodist Church.

Molly notes an organizational change. Our former Regional Council of 12 Episcopal churches

within the diocese has been broadened to become a Deanery of 23 parishes ranging from Hampstead to the Susquehanna, to be called Northern Chesapeake Deanery. Fr. Joe Zollickoffer of Holy Trinity has been named Dean.

Molly adds that our Parish Admin, Renee Vesci, will also attend Diocesan Convention, as the lay delegate from her church, St. Johns of Havre de Grace. Molly and Renee attended Lay Delegate training. Is anyone from CC interested in the lay delegate position, with voting privileges, which might also involve representing CC at the new Deanery?

Little Free Pantry is well used. Bonnie Klein's brother offered to build a larger pantry. We can repurpose the smaller box perhaps for pet products. Since church receives donations from outside our membership (thank you!), a donation box will be placed on the Annex porch for this purpose. One person called requesting a "needs list" so he can bring items to the shared pantry. A Veteran's group prepares baskets for families in need, and is asking churches to recommend recipients. Renee received the CC request and identified a possible recipient. Lois raised concerns about the effects of freezing temps on the food items in the pantry. (Note: Lyn's preliminary research suggests that a few days storage may be acceptable, but not long term.)

Christine Lane would like to see a campaign to refinish the Parish Hall floor, and will visit Vestry meeting in the future to discuss this proposed project.

Junior Warden: On behalf of Tony, Molly reports dehumidifiers require frequent emptying, but appear to keep humidity at acceptable levels. By heroically tunneling under the sacristy, Tony repaired a broken PVC pipe. Thank you, Tony!

Parking lot needs re-striping. CC met with a Scouting America member, wishing to stripe the parking lot as his Eagle project; pending lengthy review/approvals, likely spring start date.

Rock Spring Keepers: Lyn reports winterization of the pollinator garden and conservation bed. The custom CC birdbox has been mounted near the signpost visible from the Annex and parking lot, and a bluebird box put up between the playground and the Monarch Way Station.

Bible Study: Rick Baker volunteered to facilitate a Bible Study group at CC, perhaps partnering with another church, to begin the first of the year, meet via Zoom or at church; three people are interested so far. Renee has offered materials from her church. Perhaps announce in church. Meeting closed at 7:55 PM with prayer for world's oneness. Next meeting December 17, 2025.

Meet the Christ Church team of eco-stewards:

Melinda Chase – our team leader, a Harford County Watershed Steward, visionary thinker, superb home gardener. Melinda keeps our team on task, has a wonderful eye for planning and planting harmonious gardens, and serves as our interface with Interfaith Partners for the Chesapeake, and local government. Husband, **Steve Chase**, an active RSK partner who “drives a mean shovel,” has taken on noxious knotweed, creating eco-projects, and the on-going Water Turbidity Study.

Janet Clifton – eco-minded, along with husband **Fr. Larrie Smith**, Janet does Adopt-A Road pickups, performs pollinator bed and property spruce-up tasks in between extensive East-Coast travels. Janet has shared her sister’s experiences as a long-time green team member at Immanuel Episcopal Church, Glencoe.

Lyn Edmunds – team scribe. Lyn keeps RSK minutes, writes a monthly column for the CHIMES, helps organize educational programs such as Earth Day, and reports Adopt-A-Road pickups. Lyn has life-long ties to Chesapeake Bay, the health of which holds a special interest for her.

Joy Mayfield – long time CC member, Joy is a Master Gardener and environmental activist currently living in Rock Hall, MD. Joy was active planning, planting, and nurturing the pollinator bed; she travels to keep her “adopted” area of CC in good shape, and is our consultant for native plants, shrubs, trees, and pollinators.

Molly Neal - our Senior Warden, task master of campus workdays and heavy-duty projects (e.g., erecting the garden fence, tire removal, TREX Challenge), morale booster, networker, consultant for grants and church policy. Husband, **Ed Neal**, a backyard farmer, does much heavy lifting for RSK not only with his truck, but also with his expertise and efficiency.

Mary Jane Parrish – we know MJ as a terrific gardener, floral arranger, and networker, who now lives a stone's throw from the Bush River. MJ teams with her grandson to clean up Rock Spring Church Road. She helped set up a well-equipped shed as our base of operations, and has beautified many areas of church property.

Richard Tidey – a worker-bee who dives in to the most daunting tasks with a “can-do attitude.” Richard was crucial to the planning, creation, and maintenance of the Monarch Way Station. He developed a watering system during droughts, erected two birdhouses on the property, performs Adopt-a-Road pickups, and is a tenacious problem solver.

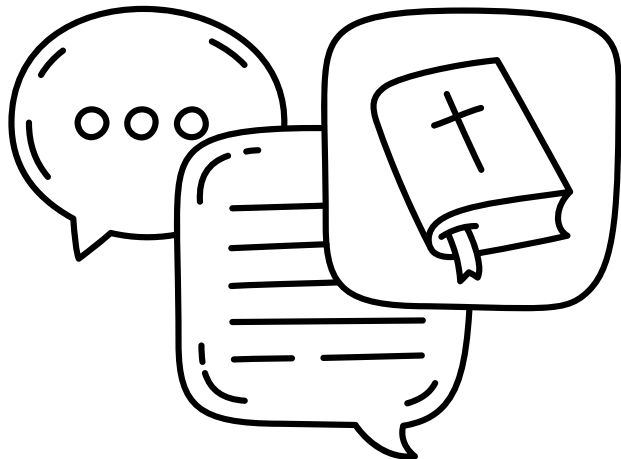

FINANCE COMMITTEE



At the Finance Committee meeting on November 10, it was reported that \$2,000 had been raised towards Parish operations by the successful “Close the Budget Gap” raffle. Joel Tidey was the lucky winner of \$500. Kate mentioned that the second approved “prudent withdrawal” from the Cemetery Endowment Fund will be transferred imminently into the operations account in accordance with the 2025 budget.

At this point in the year, our operating income has a net deficit of less than 1%. Treasurer Jane O’Leary pointed out that we have moved from a position of financial difficulty to a more positive one; our sounder finances are about having a strong foundation for being witnesses to the Gospel in the community. We discussed the possibility of establishing a process for prioritizing property improvements rather than simply being reactive as crises develop (e.g., roof damage). Discussion ensued about individuals at the Diocesan level who might help us work toward this goal.

Much of our meeting was spent working on the 2026 Budget, which will be presented to the Vestry at the December meeting.
